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FROM THE DIOCESE - SUCCESS & FAILURE

June is exam season here: Pass or fail. Succeed or fall flat. Hit or miss. Survive, thrive, or go under.... These are the thoughts running through our students' minds. Oh, and, 'when will it be over!'

But the students aren't the only ones who are under pressure, subject to self-scrutiny, and hoping for the best. Teachers are seeing the fruits of their labours, sometimes over many years, and waiting, and hoping, and praying, that students have 'taken ownership' of their learning, disciplined themselves and arrived at the exams ready, eager, and relaxed. Parents too are pushing down their own anxieties so that they can better 'be there' for their children.

The time has come to leave the past behind, its successes and failures, and - hopefully – move forward in the knowledge of God's forgiveness for the past, and care in the future.

As a parent, as a teacher, and as a student I have drawn great, and I mean great comfort from the story of the triumphal procession – the story told on Palm Sunday. On that day Jesus rode into Jerusalem and the crowds praised him – as they should. As the Christ entered his city on a donkey the crowds exulted in the arrival of the Messiah – as they should. When his people saw the Word made flesh, they welcomed him – as they should. But they were praising the one they thought would overthrow the Romans, they were exulting in a victory through violence, and they were welcoming worldly freedom, not spiritual new life – individual liberty, not the rule of God. So, in their worship: they were right, and they were wrong. It's the same with our whole lives: we're trying to get it right, but we're getting it wrong at the same time. We're a jumble of mixed motives, half baked commitments, and covert self-centredness, whether we're studying, teaching, parenting... however we're trying to serve God in the world. We should expect that because what we do with our lives is part of our worship.

So, what does God do with the wrong-headed but rightly directed praise of the Palm Sunday crowd? He uses it to scare the authorities into crucifying Jesus, he used it to save the world! God transformed the shades of grey in their lives into the technicolour of an eternal Easter. The longing to see Rome vanquished from Israel is woven into God's victory over sin, the violent victory envisioned by the crowds creatively contributes to the death of death on the cross, and the hope for personal autonomy becomes part of God's display of his own sovereign freedom.

So, as we let go of children, students, exam results, and control over the future we can find peace in the knowledge that God will weave all of our successes and our failures into his perfect plan. We can marvel at the power and compassion of Him who goes through death in order to draw the threads of our stories into one glorious his-story. And knowing what kind of God we have, we can choose humility, rest in God's grace, and find forgiveness as we give the future to Jesus.



There are many people to thank - chairman Neil Morris has been ever present and, along with Sam Robinson, has ensured that the social club is as welcoming as it has always been for visiting teams and supporters and one of the best for after match hospitality and entertainment - thank you to both of them. Committee members Pils Beecham and Archie Walkerdine have served the club for a number of years and, along with my mum and partner Heather, have also been ever present in the refreshment tent - your help is massively appreciated. As we all know, players come and go but we have managed to keep a core group of around 12-14 players who have played over or close to 100 games each, so congratulations and thanks to each and every player who pulled on the burgundy shirt over the past 5 years - you can be proud you are a part of our history.

We will be donating all kit and equipment to local junior sides over the summer so get in touch if you need anything in particular or would like us to consider your team. This summer, we will once again, be holding a charity match to continue our record of donating over £500 to good causes each and every year. This next one...



There was a short pause and then the DJ said in a somewhat more subdued voice, "I'm sorry, I got it wrong. This next one is for Charlotte, who is ill."


Marriage

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WATCHING THE WILDLIFE - JUNE CAN BE A CHALLENGE

The magpies have been in our garden rather more than usual recently. Totally ignoring the European folklore dating back to ancient Greece and Rome, which considers them soothsayers for being able to look into your soul, and the 18th century English adaptation



which created the rhyme featuring the number of magpies seen, they've probably got a nest nearby. Interestingly, whilst in the UK we say "One for sorrow ..." different cultures believe seeing a single magpie is a cause for celebration, heralding good luck. However, the perennial problem with magpies, these intelligent, social members of the Corvidae family, which include crows, rooks, jackdaws and jays, is of course that they will actively hunt for other birds' eggs and fledglings, as food for their own youngsters.

No wonder our garden's resident feisty blackbirds do their best to deter them from staying in our garden. Thinking positively, let's hope the magpies have been eating some of the destructive larvae and insects which we also share our garden with, and maybe the magpies will also do something to help keep the growing numbers of woodpigeons in check. It is that time of year when birds are once again to the fore, nesting and raising their young. Consequently, the bird feeders in our garden are getting plenty of attention as various birds seek easy food during this busy time. Whilst the majority of birds enjoying the different food from the various feeders close to the house are the smaller ones, such as sparrows and blue tits, the blackbirds have learnt how to perch on feeders to get to the seeds and fat too. A couple of days ago a magpie tried to perch on a hanging feeder further way from the house. It was all wings a-flapping as it struggled to get a purchase. Additionally, a young squirrel is getting more adept at scaling the bird table pole. Initial efforts saw repeated failure to make upwards progress, but persistence paid off and it can now awkwardly get high enough to lean precariously for a bite at the peanuts before sliding back down again. May, of course, saw the house martins return for our summer, after wintering

in Africa. They're recorded as being first seen in the south of the UK in April, but reach our area in the first couple of weeks in May. It's a joy to see their aerial activity as they swoop and soar, building their mud nests under the eaves of a house and catching insects on the wing. Whilst their numbers are in decline, this month should see them obviously active as they raise their current brood and hopefully manage a second family during our summer.



Whilst you could go to Africa in our winter to see these birds, the good thing about wildlife watching is that you don't have to travel away from home to see wildlife. Not only can we see these visitors now, but simply sitting in the garden on warm, sunny days can reward us with a variety of sights. Wearing a yellow blouse is likely to encourage aphids/greenfly to alight on you, and wearing something blue will attract bees, which will fly around you, doing no harm, simply finding out if you are a flower!

If you'd like to be more involved in nature, you can try the annual *30 Days Wild* challenge organised by the Wildlife Trusts. Throughout June they are especially encouraging you to notice aspects of nature and do something to help wildlife thrive. COOKERY CORNER - CREAMY SALMON PASTA BAKE

Stretch two salmon fillets to feed four with this easy creamy salmon pasta bake. Our budget-friendly recipe with peas and asparagus is ideal for a midweek family dinner.

Serves: 4

Hands-on time:

15 minutes

Ingredients:

350g large pasta shells
1 tbsp olive oil or 20g butter
4 spring onions, finely chopped
150ml single cream
4 tbsp half-fat crème fraîche
2 hot smoked salmon fillets flaked
150g frozen peas, defrosted
100g asparagus, chopped in 5cm lengths
Finely grated zest of 1 lemon
(plus wedges to serve, optional)
2 tbsp dill, finely chopped plus extra to serve
2 tbsp capers (optional)
50g finely grated parmesan



You will need a 22cm flameproof shallow casserole.

Method:

- 1. Heat the oven to 180°C fan/gas 6. Cook the pasta in a pan of salted water for 2 minutes less than the pack instructions, then drain, reserving a cup of the cooking water.
- 2. When the pasta is almost done, heat the oil or butter in the casserole over a medium heat and cook the spring onions for 1-2 minutes. Add the drained pasta, cream, crème fraîche and about half of the reserved cooking water, then cook, stirring constantly for 1-2 minutes until the sauce thickens. Add the remaining ingredients and enough of the cooking water to make a light sauce, stirring to coat the pasta. Season well.
- 3. Bake for 15-20 minutes until bubbling and golden. Scatter with the extra dill and serve with lemon wedges and a salad.
