A NATURAL BURIAL SITE NEAR MARKET DRAYTON

Natural or Green Burial is the environmentally friendly option to traditional burials and the trend is towards it being the most favoured mode by mid-century. Over 300 sites have been established throughout the UK since 1991. The planet needs more trees and wildflowers to encourage wildlife. While most natural burial sites cater for cremations provided the coffin or urn are biodegradable, the burning process still adds minimally to the greenhouse effect when compared to conventional cremations causing atmospheric and groundwater pollution from the coffin, its fixtures and fittings, nylon shrouds, glues, metals, hydrogen chloride, carbon dioxide, formaldehyde and furans.

Natural burial grounds are less costly to develop and maintain than crematoria and traditional cemeteries, while the hiring of a funeral director is optional for entire or selected services. Burials organised by grieving family and friends are reportedly quite therapeutic in giving closure and natural burials, by their nature, enable them to take control over practicalities to whatever extent they wish - even digging the grave themselves is not uncommon. Other expenses can also be kept to a minimum by using environmentally friendly coffins and shrouds. Site Management will always provide guidance on options. Stoke-upon-Tern Parish Councillors recently dedicated a section of its Civic Cemetery to natural burials and the intention is that it will be managed as a wildflower meadow. It is expected that this will be an interim measure prior to Shropshire Council approving Stokeupon-Tern and Sutton-upon-Tern Parish Council's concept of a Community Land Trust (CLT) within their Outline Neighbourhood Plans. These Plans have been submitted to Shropshire Council for evaluation and approval. The intention is for the Parish Councils to hold the public realm holdings - at present in the ownership of the MOD - within the CLT when Clive Barracks is de-commissioned and it is understood that a dialogue with the Land Trust was due to start week commencing 20th November, having been delayed through illness. The CLT Brief includes a natural burial site. Stoke-upon-Tern Parish domain will be to the west of the A41; Sutton-upon-Tern Parish domain will be to the east of the A41. CLTs are democratic, non-profit organisations that own and develop land for the benefit of the community and act as long-term stewards of the land and assets on it, ensuring they are put to the benefit of the community in perpetuity.

This article is to introduce a campaign to create a strong support group comprising residents of Market Drayton and District who believe in the concept of natural burial and that a long-term site needs to be established in close proximity so that the bereaved can visit more frequently than when inhibited by distance. Following launch at an event at Festival Drayton Centre on 25th October, 24 persons put their names and confidential contact details forward, while it is believed that at least 16 have spouses/partners who may well also be interested. Registering your support for the concept of a natural burial site within the CLT Brief will give maximum credence to Stoke-upon-Tern and Sutton-upon-Tern Parish Councillors' efforts in this respect.

CHILDREN'S ACTIVITY - TIN CAN WIND CHIME

Children and adults find it relaxing watching and listening to wind chimes blowing in the breeze. They look great and add interest to your garden. Wind chimes make an ideal craft activity for children of all ages as they are fun to make and will enjoy seeing them outside on display.



Equipment:

Old tin cans of various sizes A variety of bright paints Paintbrush Hammer Nail String/Coloured Wool Scissors Old metal hanger

Method:

- 1 Clean then paint some old tin cans in bright colours and patterns. Leave to dry.
- 2 Form a ring of approximately 20cm diameter using the metal hanger. Wrap coloured wool around the ring to conceal the metal. Cut various lengths of string/wool, one length for each can from

which to suspend the cans at different heights.

- 3 Pierce a hole in the top of each can using a nail and hammer. Through that hole thread a strand of string/wool and knot so that the can hangs. Attach the other end onto the ring.
- 4 Suspend in your garden.

COOKERY - VEGANUARY

This healthy vegan chilli recipe packs in plenty of vegetables and doesn't fall short on the flavour front. Serve it with rice or in jacket potatoes for a filling supper.

Ingredients:

- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 2 sweet potatoes, peeled, cut into medium chunks
- 2 tsp smoked paprika
- 2 tsp ground cumin
- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 carrots, chopped
- 2 celery sticks, chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1-2 tsp chilli powder (depending on how hot you like it)



1 tsp dried oregano

1 tbsp tomato purée

1 red pepper, cut into chunks

2 x 400g cans chopped tomatoes

400g can black beans, drained

400g can kidney beans, drained

Lime wedges, guacamole, rice and coriander to serve.

Method:

Step 1 Heat the oven to $200^{\circ}\text{C}/180^{\circ}\text{C}$ fan/gas 6. Put the sweet potato in a roasting tin and drizzle over $1\frac{1}{2}$ tbsp oil, 1 tsp smoked paprika and 1 tsp ground cumin. Give everything a good mix so that all the chunks are coated in spices, season with salt and pepper, then roast for 25 minutes until cooked.

Step 2 Meanwhile, heat the remaining oil in a large saucepan over a medium heat. Add the onion, carrot and celery. Cook for 8-10 minutes, stirring occasionally until cooked, then crush in the garlic and cook for 1 minute more. Add the remaining dried spices and tomato purée. Give everything a good mix and cook for 1 minute more.


Step 3 Add the red pepper, chopped tomatoes and 200ml water. Bring the chilli to a boil, then simmer for 20 minutes. Tip in the beans and cook for another 10 minutes before adding the sweet potato. Season to taste then serve with lime wedges, guacamole, rice and coriander.

To make in a slow cooker

Heat the oil in a large frying pan over a medium hear. Add the onion, carrot and celery. Cook for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally until soft, then crush in the garlic, tip in the sweet potato chunks and cook for 1 minute more. Add all the dried spices, oregano and tomato purée, cook for 1 minute, then tip into a slow cooker.

Add the red pepper and chopped tomatoes. Give everything a good stir then cook on low for 5 hours. Stir in the beans and cook for another 30 minutes to 1 hour. Season to taste then serve with lime wedges, guacamole, rice and coriander.







WILDLIFE WATCHER

Well that's another year over and a new one just begun. Let's hope it's a good one for us and the wildlife we share our gardens and countryside with. Winter is not over yet, but signs of preparing for spring are already visible.

Deciduous trees, which shed their leaves in autumn, had their new season's leaves in buds last year. If you watch any of them, you'll see these leaf buds gradually increase in size, ready to open when the weather and temperature agree it's spring.

Molehills were appearing in fields and verges towards the end of last year, as the unseen moles moved around, primarily in search of earthworms, but now this year, they're looking for a mate, as the main breeding season starts in February. This is the time of year when the birds are especially glad of our putting out food for them, be that in hanging feeders or on a ground feeder. As ever, fresh, clean water is something they'll search for, to drink and to bathe in. It's imperative they keep their feathers clean to aid their flight from predators and for their general health, so a bird bath or large plant-pot saucer of fresh water will help them and allow you to see them bathing before heading to cover to preen. According to numerous studies, watching the birds is good for us as well as the birds.

The sudden and quite deep snow we experienced towards the beginning of December modified our wildlife's activities. In general, everything not hibernating stayed under cover and sheltered where possible, conserving their body temperature, whether they were birds or other wildlife. The snow gave an excellent opportunity to see the footprint evidence of what had passed that way when no one was watching. Different sized birds obviously left different sized footprints. In general, birds leave prints which are more like arrowheads and, due to their size, it was clear a pheasant had been in our garden, coming close to the house.



FOX

If we're wondering whether it's a cat or fox which has walked along the side of the house, as it heads to fields or a neighbour's garden, the fox has oval-shaped prints, with the tracks being longer than they are wide. They have four equally sized toes on each paw. On each of the four toes, the fox has a claw. These claws show up in tracks, particularly the claws at the top of the two centre toes. The back pads of fox paws are triangular and often spread out from the toes. In ideal snow tracks, you

will also see the ridge in the heel pad. Foxes "direct register" when they walk, which means they place their hind foot in the track made by their front foot, so you'll only see one set of prints for each side.

Although they are a different species, cats produce tracks that are similar to fox tracks in a number of ways. Cat's paw prints also have four equally sized toes on their front and back paws. However, a key difference is that cats retract their claws when they're walking to keep them sharp for killing, so claw marks will not usually be visible in cat tracks. Additionally, their rear pads are not triangle-shaped but instead have three round lobes and their tracks are round, not oval, being only slightly wider than they are long.

Bet you're waiting for more snow now so you can go tracking!
